Questions & Answer Session

	This Delicy is far every school in Marcy?
Q	This Policy is for every school in Moray?
Α	Yes. (PW)
Q	What about the non EU pupils?
A	The current Policy does not mention non EU pupils, but we are aware that there may a level of demand for non EU pupils in the future. Admission of non-EU pupils would have to be discussed with the Director of Education and Social Care and other senior officers before any decision on admission would be made. (PW)
Q	Are the catchment areas for the denominational schools the same as non-denominational?
Α	We have not proposed any changes to the RC school zones at this time. (PW)
	The historical diocese, which form the RC school catchment areas, have larger catchment areas than the other primary schools. The transport arrangements are for within the catchment areas. There are a higher percentage of pupils receiving transport compared to that of non-denomination schools. (GJ)
Q	If someone is out of zone do they receive transport?
Α	If they live in the RC Schools' catchment areas delineated by the diocese lines
	(which are shown on our maps) they are entitled to free transport but those out

	with these boundaries are not. (GJ)
Q	What is the distance for providing transport for a primary school pupil?
A	Two miles for both primary and secondary pupils. If a child lives less than two miles from the school and there are no safe walking routes to their school, transport would be provided. This is a small number. (PW)
	For example, some children in Inveravon, in Speyside are provided with transport as there are no safe walking routes to the schools. (GJ)

Questions & Answer Session

Q	With regards to the early entry options, what are the reasons behind there
	being a 'no appeal' option for refusal for early entry?
Α	There is no current legislation that covers the appeals process. If early entry
	is refused and the parent is dissatisfied with the reason given, that can be
	pursued via the Councils complaints process. (PW)
	Every child has to be taken as an individual; we cannot take the one size fits
	all option. Consideration needs to be given to the transparency of the criteria
	for early entry and the assessment process. This may help in the
	understanding of why early entry requests have been refused. (PW)
