


#### **Reading Group Reviews**





The critically acclaimed novel A God in Ruins by Kate Atkinson was discussed at the latest meeting of Cullen Library Reading Group. However the group members found this a heavy going read and thought it wasn't as funny as the critics had declared.

Forres Library Thursday Reading Group recently read and discussed *Please Mister Postman* by Alan Johnson. Most of the group found this a very simplistic book with far too much about the 'unions'. However certain sections were deemed to be very well written especially the period when Alan's brother-in-law died due to alcoholism. Many group members felt sorry for Judy, his wife, who was hardly mentioned at all. This book was rated as good by some of

the group who had enjoyed his first autobiography, This Boy.



The Museum of Extraordinary Things by Alice Hoffman was the subject of Forres Library's Tuesday Reading Group. They reported that this was a vivid portrayal of New York in early 20<sup>th</sup> century and that the two main characters were very well described. They would recommend this title to others.



The topic of conversation at the Forres Library Wednesday Reading Group recently was *The Girl in the Glass Tower* by Elizabeth Fremantle. For many of the group the book failed to deliver as they found this historical novel to be disappointing. However there were some good elements but as a whole it lacked drama. The content had promise and the women's lives were well portrayed. The group commented that that they found an all too common trend in

this book of having parallel stories and jumping from one strand to another. They reported however that whilst being quite critical some members found this novel quite enjoyable.

Elgin Library Evening Reading Group talked about *The Dark Flood Rises* by Margaret Drabble. The subject matter of ageing and dying didn't lend itself to the liking of many of the group. However, one group member enjoyed the book so much that she subsequently read several other titles by Drabble. The consensus was that the author tried to show her knowledge of literature too much to the point where it




was pretentious and that the book had little or no plot. The language and writing was praised in places but in all most group members were uninspired by this novel.


#### New books to look out for in May



Growing up in the safety of Britain,
Jonathan Wittenberg was deeply aware
of his legacy as the child of refugees
from Nazi Germany. Jonathan, now a
rabbi, accompanies his cousin Michal as
she begins to clear the flat in Jerusalem
where the family have lived since fleeing
Germany in the 1930s. Inside an old
suitcase abandoned on the balcony they
discover a linen bag containing a bundle
of letters left untouched for decades.
Jonathan's attention is immediately
captivated as he tries to decipher the
faded writing on the long-forgotten
letters.



Picking up 10 years after 'The Future Homemakers of America' left off, 'The Early Birds' follows Peggy, Kath, Gayle, Lois, and Audrey through the turn of the 21st century. The women are now in their 70s and time is rendering its accounts payable: arthritis, cataracts, forgetfulness and departures. From the dawn of the new millennium - at which the anti-Christ unaccountably fails to appear, despite evangelist Gayle's predictions - Peggy soldiers on through new upheavals, including her exhusband Vern's Alzheimer's diagnosis, and the death of one of her live-in friends.
