REMEMBRANCE with scotland

Poppyscotland's Bud Tours Through Moray: Bringing Remembrance to Life for School Communities

For four incredible days, Bud, Poppyscotland's unique mobile learning space, travelled through Moray, offering children and young people a chance to explore the meaning and importance of remembrance. Visiting Kinloss Primary School, Bishopmill Primary School, and Lossiemouth High School, as well as hosting Hythehill Primary School at St Gerardine's Primary School, Bud delivered an unforgettable experience that left a lasting impact on each school community.

More than just a vehicle, Bud is an interactive classroom on wheels. Inside, children discovered a mini poppy factory, a micromuseum, and hands-on exhibits that brought history to life. Through these immersive activities, they learned about the history of the poppy and the selfless contributions of those who served.

The visits, organised by the Dandelion Project, sparked curiosity, thoughtful reflections and powerful discussions. Pupils explored the values behind Remembrance Day in a way that felt personal and relevant. Teachers praised the experience for making the concept of Remembrance accessible and meaningful, with one young person commenting, "I never knew a poppy meant so much."

This unique opportunity received fantastic feedback, with school communities expressing gratitude for the chance to engage with history in such a dynamic way. The enthusiasm was contagious and the learning went far beyond the walls of Bud!

What Does the Legal Duty Mean to You?

Whether you're part of the Armed Forces community, work with Armed Forces families, or are a member of the public, do you know about the Armed Forces Covenant Legal Duty?

"The Covenant Legal Duty is a legal obligation on certain public bodies to have due regard to the Covenant principles when carrying out certain functions in healthcare,



education, and housing." - Armed Forces Covenant

In line with the Armed Forces Covenant Legal Duty, the Dandelion Project is collaborating with families, schools and partners to co-design a user-friendly, one-page poster. This resource aims to raise awareness and highlight the importance of providing meaningful support for children and young people from the Armed Forces community in Moray's schools. Many children and young people from Armed Forces families thrive in education. However, increased awareness and support can help ensure they all have equitable opportunities. The Dandelion Project is creating a resource to help educators understand the Armed Forces Covenant and how to integrate it into existing school frameworks.

COFFEE & CONNECT Empowering Armed Forces Advocates in Moray's Schools

On 18th November 2024, the Dandelion Project hosted *Coffee & Connect* at RAF Lossiemouth, bringing together educators from across

Moray and representatives from RAF Lossiemouth and 39 Engineer Regiment. The event was all about building stronger connections between schools and military bases, creating sustainable partnerships to better support Armed

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Forces families. Military Commanding Officers, community support and welfare teams shared insights into their current priorities and the support available for families. Schools gained a clearer understanding of how to access these resources, empowering them to address challenges such as deployment with more confidence.

Attendees valued the chance to connect with others, share ideas and take practical knowledge back to their schools:

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DEPLOYMENT SUPPORT: Helping Schools Support

Children Through

Deployment and Separation

When a parent in the Armed Forces is deployed or away for work, children and young people can experience a range of emotions. Schools can play a key role in helping them feel understood, supported and connected during these times.

What is a Deployment?

A deployment is when a serving parent is sent away for military duties, often for weeks or months at a time. This can include overseas missions, training exercises, or other work-related separations. Sometimes, these separations are planned in advance, but they can also happen with very little notice.

Why Informing the School Matters

Informing the school about an upcoming deployment or period of separation helps ensure timely and tailored support. Teachers and staff can check in regularly, offer extra emotional support, and make adjustments if needed. Whether the deployment is known months in advance or just days before, sharing this information ensures a child does not experience these changes alone at school.

How School Can Help

When the school is aware of a deployment, they can:

- Offer emotional check-ins to help children and young people process their feelings, supporting their mental health and emotional wellbeing.
- Provide a supportive environment where children feel nurtured and respected.
- Make adjustments as necessary to ensure they feel included and supported.

How to Inform the School

Families are encouraged to complete the form linked below. The form can be:

- Filled out online and emailed directly to the school.
- Printed and dropped off at the school office.
- Collected in hard copy from local schools, St Aidan's Centre at RAF Lossiemouth, or from the Unit Welfare Office and Army Welfare Service at Kinloss Barracks.

The second page of the form includes helpful guidance explaining how this information supports a child's development and learning.

By keeping schools informed, families help create a network of care and understanding, ensuring a child's needs are met and that they can continue to thrive during these times of change.

SUPPORT FOR SEPARATION



When a parent is deployed, families experience separation in different ways. This page offers guidance and resources to help families and schools navigate this time, providing tailored support to meet unique needs. Whether a loved on is currently deployed or preparing for it in the future, these resources can help ensure the right support is in place.



Inform your child's school

Let the school know your family's Armed Forces status so they can better understand your child's needs. This allows tailored support during separations, such as emotional check-ins, flexible communication with the deployed parent, or additional pastoral care. Let the school know of any deployments as early as possible by completing <u>this form</u>.



Stay connected with the unit

Staying in touch with your parent unit keeps you informed and supported. Many units have community support or welfare teams and a HIVE officer ready to help. Joining social media groups or <u>mailing lists</u> for local Community Support/Welfare Teams can help you feel connected.



Activities to support separation

Plan activities that keep children close to their deployed parent: countdown calendars, letters, care packages, or video messages. Comforting routines provide security during this time. For more ideas, visit Moray Council's <u>Armed Forces families section</u> under the 'Deployments' drop-down tab.



Connect with organisations

There are organisations ready to help during separations. The Families Federations have provided a list of support organisations for easy access, click <u>here</u>. These offer valuable connections and practical help.



Support for young carers

If your child takes on extra responsibilities when a parent is away, they might be a young carer. Letting the school know can open doors to helpful support. <u>Quarriers</u> in Moray, <u>Forces Children Scotland</u>, <u>Carers Trust</u> and <u>Young Carers Scotland</u> all offer guidance and resources to help young carers feel supported and understood.



Books for comfort

Stories can be a comforting way for children to explore and understand their feelings during separation. They can offer reassurance, spark conversations, and help children feel less alone. For book lists, visit Moray Council's <u>Armed Forces families section</u> under the 'Deployments' drop-down tab.

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BUILDING CONNECTIONS AND INSPIRING YOUNG READERS IN MORAY SCHOOLS

Books have a unique way of connecting people and Reading Force helps make that connection possible.

The charity uses shared reading to bring families closer together, especially during deployments, turning stories into a bridge between loved ones.

It's always a delight to welcome Fiona Maxwell, the Reading Force Ambassador for Scotland, back to Moray. With her strong connections to military bases and schools, each visit introduces more families, children and schools to the benefits of shared reading.

During her most recent visit, Fiona visited Linkwood Primary School and Bishopmill Primary School, where nearly 100 books were gifted to eager pupils. A highlight was when a pupil found the Michael Morpurgo book they were searching for, their face lighting up with excitement.

Reading Force supports the establishment of book clubs by providing each member with three free books to help get started.

At St Gerardine Primary School, the Forces Book Club has been thriving, offering children a space to connect through reading. By running the club after school on Fridays, the sessions have become an opportunity for children to choose reading for pleasure, confidence and build friendships. As a reluctant reader, it's been great for my child. She was really under-confident reading in front of others, but I've noticed a huge shift since she started book club.

Reading Force does more than promote reading for pleasure. Through their scrapbooks, children and families can share thoughts, draw pictures and stay connected through stories. This simple yet powerful tool helps bridge the gap during times of separation, making reading a shared experience even when miles apart.
