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PART 1

AIMS AND ORGANISATION

AIMS

Initial Targets

In the original Home Energy Efficiency Act 1995 submission to the Secretary of state, The Moray Council stated that a 30% improvement in energy efficiency was likely to be achievable over the period covered by the act.

This 30% improvement in energy efficiency was to be made up of : -

- 7% in Council owned stock
- 5.8% from grant funding and other improvements in the private sector
- 17%+ through information and advice

The First Progress Report submitted by The Moray Council requested that, due to local circumstances, this figure be amended to 24%. This amended target was agreed by the Scottish Executive in their response to The Moray Council's First Progress Report.

Local Aims

The Moray Council aims to raise the average NHER rating of its own stock to a minimum of **5.0** by 2007. This will be attained by continuing programmes of insulation, draughtproofing, heating replacements and other related energy efficiency measures.

ORGANISATIONS

Promotion of HECA within the Authority

Responsibility for the formulation of HECA policies, and the strategy for implementation, falls under the remit of the Planning & Development Section of Community Services, whose responsibilities cover Local Authority Housing maintenance and improvements. This section has close working partnerships with other departments, ensuring that all aspects of HECA strategies are implemented.

HECA Strategy is the responsibility of the Capital Programmes Manager within the Planning & Development Section. This officer is not a dedicated full-time HECA Officer.

Committee responsibility for HECA and links with sustainability issues

Final responsibility for HECA policy approval lies with The Full Moray Council.

Stages in Formulation and Approval procedures are: -



Corporate Statement

The Moray Council's draft Corporate Development Plan 2004-2007 aims to "improve the quality of life for all people in the area by working with and for the community by delivering quality services within the available resources and powers"

The plan is developed around three key areas: the social programme, the educational programme and the environmental programme. The key objectives from the Environmental Programme with respect to energy conservation are:

- > Provide public education, information and advice to the community
- > Ensure efficient use of energy
- > Create an environment for sustainable growth
- Maintain a safe, clean, pleasant and sustainable environment.

The vision of the current Moray Community Plan is to "increase the quality of life for all sections of the community and to develop the well-being of communities in Moray". The community planning structure in Moray is now organised through an overarching community planning steering and co-ordinating group. A dedicated partnership group will develop each theme at a local level. The two groups where HECA and fuel poverty will be developed are:

Achieving a healthy and caring community – Moray Health and Social Care Partnership Protecting and enhancing the environment – Environmental Partnership

Partnerships

The Moray Council has entered into partnerships with a range of bodies, both externally, and within the Council to implement the various aspects of the HECA strategy.

North of Scotland HECA Forum

The Moray Council continues to work closely with the other members of this forum – Aberdeen, Aberdeenshire, Highland, Perth & Kinross, Angus and Dundee Council, to promote, and bring about varied initiatives, which can bring appreciable benefits to the local communities. The forum has recently

Scottish Veterans Garden City Association

A close working relationship with representatives of this organisation has led to war veterans housing within the Moray area receiving: -

- Loft tank and pipework insulation
- Floor insulation
- Low energy light bulbs

SCARF – Moray Energy Efficiency Advice Project

This SCARF and Moray Council joint project, currently provides a part time energy efficiency advice officer and an administrative support officer for the Moray area. The advice officer carries out energy surveys, home visits to discuss energy efficiency and gives information and advice on a wide range of energy issues. Over 900 individuals have received energy efficiency advice through this service, with 117 home visits having been carried out. 390 individuals were referred onwards to the various grants bodies.

Monitoring

Monitoring of overall improvements in Energy Efficiency are mainly dependent on the Scottish Executive HECA Spreadsheet.

PART 2

PROGRESS TO DATE

ACCOUNT OF MEASURES 2001 - 2003

Actual Improvements

The figures relating to energy use and CO² emissions for each tenure, calculated using the HECA2003 spreadsheet provided by Communities Scotland are as noted below.

It can be seen that the major contributor to these reductions is again the Councils' own stock, where Capital and Planned Maintenance Programmes have realised reductions of over 28% in energy use, and 27% in CO² emissions.

Other residential sectors have also shown appreciable improvement over the course of 2001-2003, and if gains in these sectors are maintained, then it appears that The Moray Council will be able to meet the agreed target of 24% overall improvement in Energy Efficiency required.

Council Owned Stock

Double Glazing to all Local Authority Stock

All Council stock is now double-glazed

Low 'E' glass to window contracts

All replacement window contracts included the fitting of low E glass as standard. Any future lifecycle window replacements on an elemental replacement basis will also comply with this specification.

• Low 'E' glass or Triple Glazing to Door Contracts

The Council has now implemented a major programme of Door Replacement Contracts. Replacing older style doors with more energy efficient double glazed, solid core doors. All contracts include the fitting of low E glazing as standard, or triple glazing as an option, where this is available. A total of 4791 individual doorsets have now been installed during this programme.

Condensing boilers

A number of condensing boiler installations have been installed as part of ongoing replacement heating contracts. These have been installed where house size is deemed technically suitable for fitment of this type of boiler.

Reflectafoil behind radiators in heating contracts

All heating contracts specify the use of reflective foil panels behind radiators fitted to outside walls. Over 900 homes have benefited from this initiative.

• Loft, tank and pipework insulation

The majority of Local authority dwellings now have a minimum of 150mm of loft insulation, all hot water tanks have suitable insulation, and hot water pipes insulated where appropriate.

Private Sector Stock

• Improvement and Repair Grants

The Moray Council continues to offer improvement and repairs grants to the Private Sector, and encourages applicants to exceed minimum levels of insulation and energy efficiency where applicable. Measures promoted include: -

Minimum of 200 mm thickness of loft insulation Low 'E' double glazing Energy Efficient heating systems Condensing boilers

Overall Improvements in Private Sector Stock

The Moray Council has no accurate figures relating to energy improvements in the private sector, and has relied on the HECA2003 spreadsheet to arrive at figures in energy savings and emission savings attributable to energy efficiency improvements carried out in this sector.

Energy Efficiency Advice Centre initiatives, Energy Efficiency Commitment and Warm Deal Funding

Moray Energy Efficiency Advice Project

The Moray Council, in conjunction with SCARF (save Cash and Reduce Fuel) provides a part time energy efficiency advice officer and administration support covering the Moray Area. This officer is accommodated within Moray Council offices at Mosstodloch, and travels throughout the Local Authority area. The advice officer participates in the yearly Moray Science Festival, provides advice sessions in local Housing Offices, provides energy efficiency talks to a wide range of bodies, and carries out home visits to discuss individual energy efficiency issues. The Moray Council has recently agreed to provide funding for this post for the remainder of financial year 2004/2005.

Local Energy Advice Centre

SCARF continues to operate the Local Energy Advice Centre covering the Moray area and this service is widely promoted by the authority. The Moray Council does not provide direct funding for this facility and it is currently provided on an in-kind basis only. In the region of 950 calls from the Moray area were received by SCARF during the period April 2001 to March 2003.

Energy Efficiency Commitment Funding (EEC)

Moray Council obtained funding from British Gas to carry out energy efficiency works to properties included in refurbishment contracts following flooding in Elgin during 2002. The contribution provided was used to part fund external wall insulation, underfloor insulation and the fitting of thermostatic radiator valves.

Information and Advice - All Residential Sectors

HECA Information

This initiative by the Community Services Department offers talks on the subject of HECA to Community Groups, Schools, and Voluntary Service contact groups in conjunction with the Moray Energy Efficiency Advice Project. Talks have been given to many external bodies who have shown interest, and to date a wide cross-section of individuals throughout the area have been given details of the Councils HECA strategy, and received information on energy efficiency.

Internal awareness

Presentations have been given to groups of Moray Council staff, advising them of HECA, its aims, and detailing other energy information and advice services offered by Community Services. This initiative will be continued in the future in order to reach all staff who have direct contact with client groups likely to be in 'Fuel Poverty'.

• Promotion of EAGA, EST schemes, Keep Warm this Winter

The Council widely promotes all available Energy Efficiency schemes and initiatives offered by bodies such as those listed above.

Leaflets outlining the services and grants available are widely circulated through Council 'Access Point' offices to reach all sectors of the population.

Information and Advice Leaflets

Leaflets have been produced covering, amongst others, the following energy efficiency and related subjects: -

Condensation; Dampness; Energy Efficiency in Grant Applications; Home Energy Efficiency 'Warm Deal' Grants; General Energy Efficiency guides; Energy Efficiency - Costs and Savings; Gas Heating, Electric Heating - User Guides.

Copies of these leaflets have been provided to all Council 'Access Points' and other premises such as public libraries for circulation. Copies of leaflets are also sent out with energy efficiency or heating related correspondence with tenants or others contacting the authority.

Cost of Measures Installed

Public Sector

Over the period covered by this report, The Moray Council expenditure on installed measures in its own stock, together with advice, and information to all sectors has totalled over £4m

Broken down into further detail, the information for the main categories of expenditure is shown on the following table.

PART 3

PERSONAL CIRCUMSTANCES AND FUEL POVERTY

Statement on Fuel Poverty

The Moray Council continues to deal sensitively with groups or individuals who have special needs.

The Moray Community Care Plan produced by The Moray Council in conjunction with Grampian Health Board contains the following statement: -

'Services that support people in their own communities and are delivered in a way that offers choice, independence, fulfilment, privacy and dignity will enhance quality of life'.

The Home Energy Conservation Act strategy also accords with the aims and priorities laid down in the Moray Council Corporate Plan, which states the intention to:-

'Enhance the quality of life for residents of Moray, develop a strategy to deal with poverty, and provide decent housing'.

The current improvement programme concentrates expenditure on energy efficiency resources in tackling fuel poverty in the most vulnerable sections of the community.

These sectors include:-

Pensioner households Families with young children, Persons in receipt of benefits.

Timescale for Policy

The Moray Council intends to make appreciable differences to the living conditions of those considered to be in 'Fuel Poverty' by the end of the 10-Year period of the Act.

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This will include: -

- Targeting of all low income households through grants, energy utility initiatives, HECA schemes, Warm Deal and low cost measures
- Provision of information and energy advice to all occupiers
- Continued targeting of public sector low income households within Moray for improvements to the energy efficiency of their homes
- Liaison with organisations and agencies who care for the elderly and disabled within the Moray area, in order to raise awareness of available energy efficiency initiatives, including the Scottish Executives' Pensioner Central Heating and 'Warm Deal' schemes.

PART 4

LOOKING FORWARD

Strategy Statement

The Moray Council intends to continue with the basis of the current strategy, and investigate ways of encouraging the private owner/occupied and rented sectors to participate to a greater degree.

Local Authority Stock

- Improvement of the average NHER rating of Council Owned Stock to 5.0 by the end of the period covered by the Act
- Maximum number of energy efficient heating systems and energy measures installed for the funding available.
- Access to a wide range of Advice and Information

Private Sector Stock

- Access to a wide range of Advice and Information
- Encouragement to access energy efficiency funding available by way of grants and other incentives
- Improvement and Repairs Grants
- Promotion of The Scottish Executive Central Heating Initiative

New Strategies

The Moray Council will continue to develop and expand on current initiatives, as well as implementing the following.

Staff Training

The Community Services Training Plan will include a programme of training for Housing Staff in Energy Efficiency issues. This will be provided using the Training pack produced by the 'Warmburgh' unit in Edinburgh, in conjunction with TransCo. It is intended to re-commence training new Housing Staff, and subsequently 'roll-out' the training to other relevant Community Services staff.

Care & Repair

A Care & Repair scheme has been set up under the control of the Private Sector Grants section within Moray Council, targeting funding at those who require assistance to maintain or improve their homes. Part of this initiative involves a close working relationship with the Moray Energy efficiency Advice Project to investigate and promote other grant funded energy efficiency measures to client groups to give added value to the level of grant funding offered.

Extension of Gas Mains

The Community Services Department is currently in contact with TransCo, discussing the possibility of providing extensions to existing gas main infrastructure to service properties with mains gas.

• Fuel Poverty Working Group

A working group consisting of representatives from Moray Council, SCARF, and Local Housing Associations has been set up to produce and promote a Fuel Poverty Strategy as part of the Moray Council's Local Housing Strategy.

Amendment of Targets

The Moray Council considers that it can attain the agreed target of a 24% reduction, by continued implementation of its policy of energy improvements and advice and information provision, and does not intend to request a further amendment at this time.
